Revelation 2:4, "Nevertheless I have somewhat against thee, because thou hast left thy first love."

Too often we allow ourselves to lose focus and become distracted by issues that have little importance or no relevance to what we are called to be or do.

Matthew 6:33 tells us, "but seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you."

People will be quick to claim they are seeking the kingdom of God, but they forget the righteousness part. How dedicated are we to following God?

In Genesis 6 the Bible gives record of the sad state to which humanity had fallen.

"And God saw that the wickedness

of man was great in the earth, and that e v e r y imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil



continually." (verse 5)

Society had sank to a point that God was upset with mankind. He made the decision to destroy the earth and all that was on it.

Most of us are very well acquainted with the story of the great flood and the boat that Noah built. The question I want us to consider is, "Why Noah?"

Imagine if Noah had left some out, or perhaps even skipped steps.

As we try to answer the call of God on our lives, we must realize there are general commands in the Bible that are given to all believers. There are also some unique callings that are placed on each individual's life.

Noah was specifically called to build the ark, and each of us have our own specific callings.

Verse 22 tells us, "Thus did Noah; according to all that God commanded him, so did he." Do we do all that God commands us to do?

Noah's obedience led to God declaring him to be righteous. Genesis 7:1, "And the Lord said unto Noah, Come thou and all thy house into the ark; for thee have I seen righteous before me in this generation."



"Honking Horns and Ringing Phones"

When we bought a Grand Prix in 1995, it came with a remote locking unit. My wife really liked the idea of unlocking it from a distance before she got to it.

I thought it was alright for her but since I carry the car keys in my pocket, I didn't want a remote control on my set of keys to the car.
