"Then said Jesus unto his disciples, If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me." Matthew 16:24



BMA of America Bids Farewell to Former Seminary President

Dr. Philip Ray Bryan, previously of Jacksonville, TX, passed away May 20, 2024, in Lebanon, OH, where he resided for the past five years.

Funeral services were held Friday, May 31 at Autry Funeral Home in Jacksonville with Dr. Jeffrey Bryan and Dr. David Hallum officiating.



He married Ida Janice Finley at Martin's Prairie Baptist Church in Keith, TX, where he served as pastor while attending the North American Theological Seminary (name later changed to the Baptist Missionary Association Theological Seminary).

Canada, he lived for more than 50 years

as a resident of Jacksonville.

They were married on June 9, 1961, and blessed with three sons, Jeffrey, Joel, and Jon. In Jacksonville they were active members of First Baptist Church for many years, joining Afton Grove Baptist Church after retirement.

Dr. Bryan was best known for his continuing relationship with the BMA Seminary where he endeavored to pass on his faith through gifts of teaching and administration.

At the seminary he completed his Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1962 and began to serve as a part-time instructor before accepting full-time teaching responsibilities in 1963.

Twice he served as the seminary's dean-registrar (1967-75, 1979-83) and then as president beginning in 1983.



Retiring from administration duties in 1999, he returned to the classroom as a professor of theological-historical studies until full retirement. teaching New students in Testament Greek. theology, church history, and biblical surveys.

His academic accomplishments fully supported his service to the Lord having earned an Associate of Arts from Jacksonville Baptist College (1956); a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Oklahoma (1958); a Bachelor of Divinity from the BMA Seminary (1962); and a Master of Arts (1966) and a Doctor of Philosophy (1973) from Baylor University.

His doctoral research concluded with a dissertation entitled "An Analysis of the Ecclesiology of Associational Baptists, 1900-1950."

Dr. Bryan was ordained to the gospel ministry in 1956 by the Missionary Baptist Church at Norman, OK, with pastorates in Oklahoma, New York, Texas, California, and Mississippi.

He also served as dean of the Southeastern Baptist College in Laurel,

MS, and was elected the vice president of the Council of Southwestern Theological Schools.

In addition, he traveled to preach and teach extensively throughout the southern United States and helped prepare ministers for service in Russia, Mexico, Eastern Europe, Belarus, and Myanmar (formerly Burma).

Dr. Bryan is survived by his wife of almost 63 years, Ida Janice (Finley) Bryan who resides in Lebanon, OH; his brother, William Patrick Bryan; his children, Dr. Jeffrey Alan Bryan (1962) and wife Jacquelyn of Lebanon, OH; Dr. Joel Arthur Bryan (1963) and wife Shannon of Muncie, IN; and Jon Foster Bryan (1967) and wife Tami of Greenville, SC.

He was also blessed with six grandchildren: David Bryan and wife Dalal of Puyallup, WA; Laura Hall and husband Rev. Jerry David of Swannanoa, NC; Wende Woolard and husband Aaron of Fort Riley, KS; Luke Bryan of Indianapolis, IN; Sydney Bryan of Muncie, IN; and Andrew Bryan of Tyler, TX.

His great-grandchildren include Stanley, Bennett, and Jocelyn Hall; Michael Bryan; and Wesley Woolard.

Dr. Bryan is preceded in death by his parents, Harry and Frances (Foster) Bryan, and brother, Harry Lynn Bryan.

Honoring Dr. Bryan as pallbearers were David Bryan, Andrew Bryan, Luke Bryan, and David Hall.

We were blessed once again to work alongside the great folks from Goodall Construction as they set the trusses and roofed the two new wings.

The building is a beautiful metal building with rooms on one end and an open gym area on the other. The open end can be used for basketball, volleyball, and all kinds of community events.

The framing of the rooms on one end were done last fall, and The Master's Builders were needed this visit to install 16 ft. studs in the gym area and put up smart siding on all the walls. Smart siding was also installed in the restrooms, kitchen, youth room, Prophet's chamber, and a storage room.

However, several of the young preachers wanted to be like him, so they did the same thing. The only thing it did for them was to make it appear they were

very sloppy and lazy.

A n o t h e r preacher wore glasses. During his sermon he constantly took them off, put them in his pocket, only to take them out and replace them

on his face, then back in his pocket, back on his face, etc.

I really enjoyed his sermons, but that was very distracting to me.

Several young preachers who wore glasses were soon doing the same thing with their glasses.

If I imitated my Grandpa Abney's style I would be a lot louder and never need a microphone. Some of our elderly members might think that was great.

However, I would also preach one and a half to two hour sermons, instead

of my 25 to 30 minute ones. I don't think anyone in our church would think that was so great.

In 1 Corinthians 15:10 Paul wrote, "...by the grace of God I am what I am." Many places in the Bible God called men to serve Him.

Moses said (in effect) "Here I am, but send Aaron."

When He called Gideon, he thought God ought to call someone else.

Even Paul declared himself "the least of the apostles, that I am not meet to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God." 1 Corinthians 15:9

Regardless of who is involved God called the one He wanted, with all the faults, strengths and weaknesses. He's still doing that today.

In 1 Peter 4:11, Peter gave us our rule and reason for preaching. "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God; if any man minister, let him do it as of the ability which God giveth; that God in all things may be glorified through Jesus Christ, to whom be praise and dominion for ever and ever. "Verily, verily, I say unto you, Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone: but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit. He that loveth his life shall lose it; and he that hateth his life in this world shall keep it unto life eternal."

John 12:24-25
