The downside to this doctrine is the attitude many "Baptists" have when it comes to being fruitful.

"Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone. Yea, a man may say, Thou hast faith, and I have works: shew me thy faith without thy works, and I will shew thee my faith by my works. Thou believest that there is one God; thou doest well: the devils also believe, and tremble. But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without works is dead?" James 2:17

I know that I am not the only one who has heard it be said that someone is saved, and they have their fire insurance policy.

Let me be clear as to my position on this concept; this is absolutely unbecoming of a Christian. We should never have the attitude that just because we are saved that we should have no concern as to our behavior.

The world suffers greatly when Christians display poor testimonies. How can we show a lost and dying world the benefits of having a savior when our behavior is no different from theirs?

We often forget that saved people are supposed to be different.

"Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things become new." 2 Corinthians 5:17

Call it judgment, or call it discernment, but we all arrive at conclusions based upon what we observe in an individual's life. We wouldn't tolerate certain behavior from a spouse or a pastor or a deacon.

"Now then we are ambassadors for

Christ, as though God did beseech you by us: we pray you in Christ's stead, be ye reconciled to God." 2 Corinthian 5:20

What is an ambassador? Webster's 1828 Dictionary, "1. A minister of the highest rank employed by one prince or state, at the court of another, to manage the public concerns of his own prince or state, and representing the power and dignity of his sovereign."

So, Christians are representing Jesus as we manage the Lord's affairs among the lost.

How does our behavior, the actions we take, represent our Lord and savior? Our mission in this life is the fulfillment of the Great Commission.

Matthew 28:19-20 says, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen."

To be effective teachers, we must have good testimonies. It is ineffective to tell someone not to smoke if you have a pack of cigarettes in your pocket. It is hard to tell someone not to drink with a beer can in your hand.

So much truer it is to show a sinner his need for Christ when his behavior is no worse than your own.

There is a difference between telling and teaching, with teaching actually causing a change. There should be no baptisms without conversions, therefore, the implication of the Great Commission is that we actually help to facilitate change in people.

Lost people do what lost people do. Isn't it time that the saved people live as we should in order to make a difference for the cause of Christ?

"Silence is Consent!"

"And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them." Ephesians 5:11

We read a lot in Scripture about separating ourselves from the ungodliness of the world. Paul spoke more than just a little on this subject in his letters to the various churches in his mission field.

Galatians 5, Ephesians 5 & 6, Philippians 1, and Colossians 3 are just some of Paul's admonishments for how we should walk with the Lord, not after the things of the flesh.

Not only are we to separate from the ways of the world, we are to "reprove them." To reprove means to bring under conviction. Paul told Timothy to "... reprove, rebuke, exhort with longsuffering and doctrine." [2 Tim 4:2]

My thoughts for our spiritual growth on this subject are that we must be more



aggressive in our spiritual walk; not just being a "silent" witness to wrong-doings but reproving, rebuking, and exhorting those who are in the unfruitful works of darkness.

A "lifestyle evangelism" is good. It lets others see Jesus in us. But, I don't believe "lifestyle evangelism" can stand alone in witnessing Jesus. That's where reproving, rebuking, and exhorting comes into play. These three tenets all indicate oral conversation. Rebuke is to point out sin, reprove is to bring under conviction, and exhort is to encourage strongly.

In speaking the biblical instructions to our friends and loved-ones, we must be careful that we do all things in LOVE. The admonition from the Scriptures should not come across to the recipient as a tongue lashing, or scolding.

Gentleness in tone of voice is a "must" when sharing the Gospel.

There are some very gifted men and women who can speak more forcibly to the right person, knowing when to "get tough" with their words, but for most people, we need to focus on soft speech.

The poor little rodent that has been sent down the toilet, traveling through the sewer (now those are some bad places!) or fallen into the river doesn't even think about giving up.


He doesn't even have the faintest thought that he might not make it. Why? To put it plainly, the Lord gave him that ability and simply trusts in it.

"That Reminds Me

"Brain First, Then Mouth!"

Most of us have put our mouths in motion before our mind is engaged. Somehow it's embarrassing, but sometimes humorous.

One of my cousins was a very good artist. He painted wildlife, horses and old west scenes. He had sold several of those, but he hadn't had tremendous success.

Not because of the quality, but because his friends and relatives were the first ones to see them and thought they were great. But they also thought (and said) he ought to give them the paintings without cost.

One day, Glen was showing me some of his paintings. Before I realized I was going to say it I said, "These are really good! Why don't you sell them?"

He grinned and said, "Say! That's a good idea." I immediately knew I had put my mouth in motion before engaging my brain.

As a preacher, I've done that a couple of times. I was moderator for an associational meeting. One of my duties was to ask someone to bring a devotional to set the spiritual tone for the meeting. These aren't to be long, nor are they supposed to be anything controversial or deeply theological.

A young preacher whom I hadn't seen in awhile was there. This time of meeting is an ideal place for a young preacher to get some exposure. Since most pastors want to hear them it gives the young man an attentive audience. I asked him to bring the devotional. He was very happy about it and I gave no more thought to it.

However, when the young preacher got up to give his devotional, I was thrown into shock because he immediately told us he was divorced and didn't believe in remarriage after divorce. To emphasize his strong feelings he declared he would never remarry and further it was a grievous sin for

anyone to remarry after divorce.

That was his opinion and he was entitled to it, but it was much too divisive a subject to bring up in a five or ten minute devotional which was to set the tone for harmony in an associational meeting.

However, my shock wasn't complete on the subject, because obviously he had not idea what a devotional was. He went on for about thirty minutes. All of it was about divorce, the reasons, and his commitment to never remarry.

Due to the fact we practice freedom of speech in such meetings we don't cut someone off. I was in a real quandary about how to handle this when he suddenly shut it down.

I think my comments when I resumed the moderator-ship was, "Well, that's certainly something to think about." I then immediately distanced the meeting from that experience.

However, I made a mental note to make sure my brain was engaged before asking someone to bring a devotional in future meetings.

James probably never heard, "Be sure your brain is engaged before putting your mouth in motion." But from his comments in James 1:19, he knew the principle.

"Wherefore my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak...".

Many problems have resulted from some who reverse James's instruction and are slow to hear and swift to speak. Personally, I've never had to apologize for being to slow with a decision or words, but I have at least regretted many decisions or words that were too hasty.
