"The Morality of Politics"

Many Christians are divided as to what, if any, role they should play in politics. Our Untied States Constitution does not grant any rights but rather protects our God-given rights.

There is a biblical principle we must consider; the bible clearly states we are to be good stewards of what God gives us. Our freedom of religion, covered by the first amendment, guarantees Americans the ability to worship God as we choose.

As government tramples on the rights of citizens, our liberties are directly affected. As attempts are made to suppress Bible truths citizens must realize the laziness leads to loss of rights. So when we fight for any constitutional right, we are fighting to protect them all, including being able to preach.

A number of years back there was a major U S city who had a mayor tell preachers they had to submit their messages before they preached them. This mayor, from what I heard, was pushing for any speech addressing sexual orientation to be approved.

The Texas Tribune had an article October 16, 2014, The Guardian, October 17, 2014, Time Magazine, October 17, 2014, as did many other news agencies.

This should never have happened but thank God we have a "pesky little document" that some liberals hate called the Constitution. There was considerable backlash and evidently this unconstitutional attempt failed. This is a clear example of why we need to closely watch the attempts of state, federal and local legislators.

In Oklahoma we have many bills being considered that would potentially restrict, if not eliminate, our constitutional rights. In the matter of Senate Bill 857 and House Bill 1626

and the use of automatic license plate readers, including, but not limited to "Flock" cameras. They are pushing these bills in the name of safety, all the while violating our rights.

Upon review of the proposed bills, the House Bill 1626 and the Senate Bill 857, I have to recommend complete rejection of the language and intent of these proposed pieces of legislation. Amendment IV of the US Constitution says, "The right of the people: to be secure in their person, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures shall not be violated, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the person or things to be seized."

So what does the word "effects" mean? I searched the definition online, Webster's 1828 dictionary.

The applicable definition reads as follows: "In the plural, effects are goods; moveables; personal estate." (The people escaped from the town with their effects.)

Though cars were not in existence at this time, buggies were. Thank God the word used here is effects, otherwise the Amish would be protected, but we would not. Cars

are moveable parts of a person's estate. Without a search warrant that particularly describes what is to be searched, and what is to be seized, this would make using these devices a constitutional violation.

Seizing information is like seizing one's papers. The state has personal information on record tied to the vehicle's license plate number. The state makes the claim that we have no reasonable expectation of privacy while in public.

A citizen has a protected First Amendment right to take pictures. They do not have access to state data. They do not make arrests as the state does.

The Constitution was written to protect citizens from governmental overreach. So according to the Fourth Amendment, we DO have a right to expect privacy from the GOVERNMENT.

The bills describe that after 30 days information is to be completely deleted. Once data is electronically captured it cannot be tracked as it is shared. There is absolutely no way we can be sure it is 100% deleted. Data captured by Chinese backed companies must give the Chinese government access to their data.

Tik Tok is scheduled to be banned because the Chinese are getting our data. Section 4.2 of the Flock (ALPR camera company) agreement states: "Customer grants Flock a non-exclusive, irrevocable, worldwide, royalty -free, license to use the Customer Generated Data for the purpose of providing Flock Services." So for the very reasons Tik Tok is to be banned, so should these cameras.

Another concern is that every law enforcement agency is to develop a policy for

"Ten Times"

I have read my Bible from beginning to end several times since accepting Christ but it has been a while. So I decided I would do it again this year.

I was a little halfway through the book of Numbers when the Lord stopped me cold in my tracks. As I read Numbers 14:22-23 my mind kept going over and over these two verses.

"Because all those men which have seen my glory, and my miracles, which I did in Egypt and in the wilderness, and have tempted me now these 10 times, and have not hearkened to my voice; surely they shall not see the land which I sware unto their fathers, neither shall any of them that provoked me see it:"

"Contrasting Examples"

One of my cousins whose "elevator didn't got to the top floor" once called me a "Funeral Go-er," which meant she thought I went to funerals just for the sake of going to a funeral.

In the first place, as a minister, I'm required to go to most of the ones I attend because I'm the one handling the thing.

In the second place, I've never attended a funeral of someone I didn't know or who wasn't related to someone I knew.

And in the third place, since she didn't like me, I don't know why she even cared what I did.

I give you that about my cousin because this article involves another funeral I attended and I didn't want you to think of me as a "Funeral Go-er." I really do enjoy other forms of entertainment more. Also, I do have sources for bulletin articles other than funerals.

One of the last funerals I attended was a very spiritually comforting one. The songs and the message were great. The text used was John 3:16 which directed everyone to Jesus.

As I sat listening to the services I truly appreciated those who were giving such comfort to the family who had lost a mother, sister, and wife.

Suddenly I thought of another funeral I attended not too long before that in which there was no spiritual understanding of what had taken place.

The message was a very superficial one that gave very little hope to those left behind. Jesus was only mentioned a couple of times, but then, more in passing than as the source of comfort needed by those left behind.

disturbed that family was left without the comfort Jesus offers in times of such loss. Why aren't they given the same type of hope this one was offering to this family.

Almost as if in answer to my silent, mental question, the thought came to me. I was privileged to attend this service in order to be reminded of my responsibility as a minister to those attending this service, to point them to Jesus as the source of the comfort they need.

Please understand. Life isn't "about me" and this funeral wasn't "about me." The service was in memory of the one who had gone to be with the Lord and for the comfort of those left behind. I was only an observer.

But life is God's classroom. He has lessons for us all. He gives the lesson and it is up to us what we do with it. Our

experiences should all be applied to our life so we can learn more about God and how to serve Him in a greater way.

This service was going to be held whether I attended or not, but God had a lesson for me that was available at that funeral. But God had a lesson for everyone who attended that funeral. What they do with it is between them and God.

There was a man once who had a terrible reputation in his town. He was just about everything he shouldn't be and nothing he should be.

A minister in town had a reputation for always seeing the best in everyone. He never said anything bad about anyone.

When this man died everyone attended the funeral to see what the preacher could possibly say good about this wicked man. The preachers said, "Well, he was an example to us all. A horrible one, but an example for us, nonetheless."

Thank the Lord the contrast between these two funerals. One was a horrible example and the other a blessed example.

forced into homelessness, could potentially lose existing services.

the use of these systems. Without a statewide policy there will be no consistency or continuity to policy.

Truth is we are asking the fox to develop a policy to protect the hens in the henhouse. The description of data is so broad and inclusive as to prevent people being secure. The requirements are not exclusive to the specific vehicle, but could potentially encompass many innocent people and their vehicles.

People and the inside contents of the vehicles are photographically captured and retained. This is way too broad with too much opportunity to be abused.

Also, how can you control data that is overseas or in another country? You cannot legislate the affairs of another country.

Now the section on penalties refers only to civil repercussions. There should also be criminal repercussions to those who are in government who violate citizen's rights. Further, what guidelines are in place for adding things to the "Hot List", that will ultimately lead to unwelcome interactions with law enforcement.

Keep in mind that some of the biggest supporters of these cameras are those who financially benefit from the seizing of property captured with the assistance of ALPRs. So it is to be expected that district attorneys and police departments would love this padding of their resources, henceforth their support.

An example of a potentially good piece of legislation would be House Bill 1043. This would invalidate certain driver's licenses from

other states. This would be undocumented immigrants who cannot prove they are here legally.

A good summary of this bill is as follows: "If a drivers license is of a class of licenses issued by another state exclusively to undocumented immigrants who are unable to prove lawful presence in the United States when the licenses are issued, the driver license or other permit purporting to authorize the holder to operate a motor vehicle on public roadways, is invalid in the State of Oklahoma and does not authorize the holder to operate a motor vehicle in this state."

We have had an invasion of others who do not share our values, nor respect our laws or the Constitution. Our nation is being overrun by people who do not share our Christian values, and they vote for people and legislation that attack our Christian ideals.

Another example of a very bad bill would be Senate Bill 484. This law would prohibit municipalities with populations under 300,000 from being involved with assisting the homeless.

Interestingly enough the definition of homelessness contained in this bill does include some victims of domestic violence. A city could not even lease property for fair market to private entities to help.

If this passes the effective date would be November 1, 2025, and would force existing or current services to be immediately terminated. So some homeless people, who are victims of crimes and
