What is America's hope? We must claim God's promise of healing.

Il Chronicles 7:14. God says, "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land."

We must meet several conditions before healing can come:

First, God's people m u s t h u m b l e themselves before a holy and righteous God. We must become broken in our souls and spirits in

order for our Father to renew us.

Second, we must pray. We must renew our daily fellowship with the Father. Our Father desires to spend time with us, but do we desire to be in His presence? Prayer is essential.

Third, we must turn from our sin. How can we do this? Dr. Adrian Rogers said that we must "name it, nail it and forsake it." We must identify and confess our faults to the Father.

John said, "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness". (I John 1:9).

Fourth, we must not carry our guilt around. Every believer must "nail" his

sins to Christ's cross. They have been paid for by Christ's blood, and they will not be held against us.

Paul declared, "Blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us, which was contrary to us,

and took it out of the way, nailing it to his cross" (Colossians 2:14).

The songwriter wrote,
 My sin, oh the bliss
 of this glorious thought,
My sin not in part, but the whole;
 Is nailed to the cross,
 and I bear it no more,
Praise the Lord, praise the Lord,
O my soul.

Fifth, we must "forsake" wickedness. When we forsake a wicked life, we literally run from it. Paul told Timothy, "Flee also youthful lusts..." (II Timothy 2:22).

Are we willing to forsake the worldly lifestyle and embrace righteousness? Will we let Jesus lead us?

When these conditions are met, our Father will forgive us. He will wipe the slate clean, and give us a fresh start. He will fellowship with us and bless His children again.

Jesus said, "Behold, I stand at the door, and knock; if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me" (Revelation 3:20). Glory!

Our American and Christian hope is Jesus, God's only Son.


After a Lip Sync with nearly all teams represented the Hall Wars Champions were announced with the Commuter Girls (Purple Team) taking home the trophy!

Just a tad bit of a difference wouldn't you say? Those tiny little dot's we call periods and itty bitty curves called commas when put in the wrong places changed the whole meaning of the letter drastically.

Amazing the power they have, isn't

it? An overlooked reality is that ALL little things make a difference, but even more so to God.

While many might d i s a g r e e , something counted as a small thing among people is wisdom. Yes folks

may profess and proclaim its great importance, but when it comes to choosing wisdom as the most significant and desirable aspect of their lives, it suddenly plummets to somewhere near last place.

Financial security, prosperity, comfort, achievement, and many other things quickly take wisdom's first place position in their lives.

Too bad more of us aren't like Solomon. Solomon was in a position to have anything the carnal heart could desire but he chose wisdom. I think he was already pretty wise to begin with don't you?

"In Gibeon the LORD appeared to Solomon in a dream by night: and God said, Ask what I shall give thee."

1 Kings 3:5

This scripture makes it very clear that wisdom is paramount to God. He further stresses this in Proverbs 30:24-29.

"There be four things which are little upon the earth, but they are exceeding wise:

The ants are a people not strong, yet they prepare their meat in the summer;

The conies are but a feeble folk, yet make they their houses in the rocks;

The locusts have no king, yet go they forth all of them by bands;

The spider taketh hold with her hands, and is in kings' palaces."

He uses four living wonders of His creation that people would certainly count as trivial and irrelevant in the scheme of things, but God has some big lessons for us to learn.

Ants are pretty common to us. They aggravate, frustrate and annoy us in general, so how can they teach us anything about wisdom?

Ants are a perfect example of cooperation. They work together with great efficiency. One ant is not concerned to be elevated above another ant. They labor side by side as equals, keeping their focus is on the job before them.

"Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves." Philippians 2:3

We need more Christian "ants" in our churches, homes, and work places. Can you imagine the impact God's people would have on the world if they worked together as the ants do?

The opposite is far too common among believers. They loudly declare their love of God and dedication to His work, but all they do is work against Him.

"They profess that they know God; but in works they deny him, being abominable, and disobedient, and unto every good work reprobate." Titus 1:16

You see them in churches everywhere. Their focus is not on what they can do to help, but on themselves and what "they" think should be done. Instead of stepping in and becoming part of the team, you hear them criticizing their brothers and sisters in Christ, their pastor, and their church in general.

They complain loud and clear about

The Master's Builders at Camp Garwood



On March 31, The Master's Builders began work on a newly poured slab at Camp Garwood, in Garwood, MO. The camp is about 12 1/2 miles NE of Van Buren, Missouri.

This was our first time going to Camp Garwood to work, and we were so very blessed during our time there. The Camp Director, Chris Polk, and his wife, Laura, were so caring and concerned about our needs as we settled in for our two weeks of work.

We were all able to stay in a newly renovated dorm there, and that made it so convenient for the job site and the cafeteria.

The Builders were at Camp Garwood to help with a 20 X 60 building. This building includes two living quarters for visiting evangelists, group leaders, etc., on one

side, and a nurse's station and quarters on the other.

Between the two sides of the building Chris Polk wanted to make sure to include a nice breezeway that will have a large ceiling fan and benches. This will help facilitate check-in and a cooldown area for campers.

The Builders framed the building, put in doors and windows, hung metal siding in two colors on the exterior, and the electrical wiring was run for the building.

Joe McElroy and Jacob Hale of McElroy Construction did the trusses and added the metal roofing. It was such a pleasure to have these guys do this work as the Builders are no longer

able to set trusses!

While we were there, this area of Missouri and Arkansas had historical and catastrophic flooding. The Builders were unable to work on the building for two days.

Several locations around the area received 12 to 15 inches of rain, and the creeks and hollows filled up quickly! We had to keep a close eye on the camp creek for a couple of days! There were also several tornadoes, and The Builders were thankful that none touched down near the camp. The rain set us back a bit but we enjoyed two afternoons of movies in the cafeteria and some delicious meals.

The BMA Churches of Southeast Missouri certainly kept us well-fed! We were overwhelmed and blessed by their commitment to making sure we lacked for nothing. Meals, supplies, desserts, and snacks were either brought in or money was

sent in to help with providing meals for

"That Reminds Me"

"Changing Times"

During this past year, gas prices have been up and down worse than a kid on a trampoline. No one seems to know where it is going to stop, but most know it will not go back to anywhere near \$1 per gallon of a few years ago.

I thought about the price of gas one day when I pulled into Sam's. The price was \$2.00 per gallon.

People were lined up at all the pumps. That was because every service station in town had gas from six to ten cents per gallon more.

Everything seems to be relative. Sam's \$2.00 was cheap when compared to the service stations selling gas for \$2.08 just down the street. However, compared to the price of gas when we lived on the farm, 19 cents per gallon, Sam's was outrageous.

I recall several occasions when I've pulled into a service station for gas and discovered their price was several cents a gallon more than the station just across the street. I've been told most people just go ahead and buy gas there because they would have been too embarrassed to leave.

Not me! I just drive off.

The rising price of gas reminds me of when it started going up in Oklahoma. It had been below 50 cents per gallon for a long time, and we weren't ready for it to go higher. They had some sort of crisis in the oil industry and they joyfully began raising the prices. I hadn't liked it but I had paid almost 60 cents per gallon when I filled up at home.

We had gone out of town and had to fill up before returning home. I pulled up to the pumps of a likely looking service station. The price wasn't posted so I figured it might be slightly higher. The attendant came running out and asking, "Fill it up?"

Before answering I looked at the price on the pump. It had 89 cents per gallon. I asked, "Is that price right?" He said, "Yes."

Restarting my car I said, "I'm not paying that much for gas! I bought gas this morning for 60 cents per gallon."

He said, "I don't know why you thing that's high. Milk is \$1.36 a gallon and no one complains."

I gather this man had never heard of comparing apples to oranges. I said, "Well, I'll tell yoj for sure, I can go a lot further on a gallon of milk than on a gallon of gas." He looked as if he couldn't believe it when I drove away.

The man's comparison between the price of milk and the price of gas reminds me of a lot of other comparisons that are designed to get

others to accept some unacceptable behavior.

A preacher who smoked got tired of others condemning his habit. One day he said, "The next one who says anything about my smoking may find me putting my cigarette out in their cup of coffee." He was implying drinking coffee and smoking cigarettes were equal.


I don't do either of those, but they are not equal in the weight. The preacher my have had a point about his critics, but his comparison of coffee and cigarettes was like comparing milk and gas.

Although sin is sin in the sight of God, some sins are more atrocious than others.

John writes in 1 John 1:8-10 of some sins and said we may be forgiven of those when we confess them.

In Matthew 12:31-32 Jesus declared blasphemy against the Holy Spirit to be an unpardonable sin.

That's not a contradiction. Those are so much two different sins as milk and gas are two different liquids.

the goal of the colony.

"Only let your conversation be as it becometh the gospel of Christ: that whether I come and see you, or else be absent, I may hear of your affairs, that ye stand fast in one spirit, with one mind striving together for the faith of the gospel;" Philippians 1:27

You will find Christians who constantly bicker and argue with others. How can this further the work of God? We all know it destroys it.

I have never seen two ants from the

same colony fighting have you? When there is a fight it is always against the enemy not a fellow member.

We too have one common enemy and that is Satan, not one another.

"For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places."

Ephesians 6:12

When there is a true battle with an enemy no ant will run away. It is literally a fight to the death: nothing but total commitment.

In the heat of spiritual battles where Satan is making things difficult and uncomfortable, a lot of Christians take off, leaving others to deal with the problems and conflict.

Last of all, one of the ants greatest display of wisdom is the one mentioned in Proverbs 30:25, is how they diligently work during the harvest. No preacher, teacher, or leader is needed to get them working. It is of their own incentive.

Their motivation doesn't come from a program or course prepared for them. Simply, the harvest is there and the work needs to be done.

That's it. That's the reason for their tireless, intense labor. Now is the time of harvest for us too.

"Say not ye, There are yet four months, and then cometh harvest? behold, I say unto you, Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest." John 4:35

Christ's coming is so near, but where are the workers? Lost souls are dying every second and are beginning their first day of an eternity in Hell. It is time we all apply the wisdom of the little ant, and tirelessly be about the work of the Lord in oneness and peace.
